

## The Secret Millionaire

## *The Secret Millionaire*



### 3 Now read the first line of each paragraph and compare with your ideas.

Nowadays Mike Greene is a multi-millionaire. He **lives in the lap of luxury**, in a 7 bedroom mansion, with his wife and two daughters. But he wasn't always so **well-off**. In fact, when he was a child he was **living on the breadline**. His family were so **hard up** that they couldn't even afford a house; all five of them lived in a small caravan. At the age of 7, Mike decided he had to help his Mum, a single parent. He got his first job, delivering newspapers.

When he was a little older, the same newsagent gave Mike another job, working in the shop on Saturdays. Mike found he was good at retail, eventually becoming a millionaire at the age of 38.

Mike wanted to do something to help kids and young adults in the same deprived areas of Peterborough where he grew up. So he appeared on the popular reality TV show, Secret Millionaire.

In each episode, a millionaire leaves their **well-heeled** life behind to go and live undercover in an poor area of the country, working and volunteering in the community to find people or projects they think deserve to be given some financial help.

Mike first went to take a look at Time Stop, a hostel for homeless young people. More than 78,000 young people in Britain experience homelessness every year. Time Stop provides temporary accommodation for 16-25 year olds, helping them to learn some life skills, such as cooking and budgeting, to make them less dependent and better able to look after themselves.

Mike realised that many of these young people had given up hope of ever getting a job, so, using his professional experience and expertise, he helped one of them, Jay, to write a more impressive CV and apply for jobs.

Mike also wrote a letter to thank the newsagent who had helped him by giving him his first job. The newsagent had believed in him, and helped him to believe in himself. Otherwise, Mike felt, he might never have achieved what he had.

Next Mike visited New Ark- an award-winning adventure playground and city farm. New Ark provides affordable childcare in one of the most deprived areas of the city. Many of the children come from single-parent families, and their parents are only able to work because they can send their children there. The average cost of after school child-care in Britain is £97 pounds a week. For these parents, always **strapped for cash**, such a sum of money would be impossible. Run as a charity, New Ark provides the same care for £55 a year. But when Mike visited, New Ark was **living from hand to mouth**. The project had lost funding, and looked likely to have to close down; disastrous for the families that depend on it.

Mike spoke to Nicky, one of the workers at New Ark, who told him about how she'd missed out on her childhood looking after her brothers and sisters, and how she wanted to help other children have somewhere safe and fun to go after school. Talking about this made Mike realise that he had also not really had a childhood, and he made the decision to stop working quite so hard, and spend more time with his daughters while they were growing up.

In the final part of the programme, Mike revealed that he was actually a millionaire, and **rolling in money!** He gave First Stop a cheque for £20,000 and promised to volunteer two evenings a month, helping young people to write successful job applications. He gave New Ark a generous £40,000 and promised to personally make sure that they never had to close. Since then he has become the President of New Ark, helping to raise money, and he and his family visit regularly.

Through Secret Millionaire, Mike has certainly changed the lives of many young people for the better, but he has also changed his own life. 'Giving money is easy', he said, 'Giving time, emotion and dedication is a far greater gift.'
